4. Chair's Report (Melissa Extross)

Kinder Info Night

February 2nd, Melissa and Jillian represented AVPS School Council during the Kindegarten Information Night. It was a lovely evening, there were a few parents who came by and spoke with us who wanted to get involved. One couple had been former students at Alta Vista and were bringing in their own children. One of the grandfathers of a soon-to-be student was a former chair of school council.

5. Administrative Report (Dennis Paré, Principal)

• Evacuation plan update

Last month, there was smoke in the building and the children and staff needed to evacuate the building. The time spent outside was not great for the children. We initiated the evacuation to St. Timothy's but it wasn't open, nor could we get in touch with anyone who could open the building. We later regained access to the school building shortly after so we canceled the evacuation plan. We decided to reroute our evacuation to Ridgemont High School. Dennis visited St. Timothy's and learned that it's actually not big enough for evacuation. It only holds 400 when we have 700 students and staff. We have altered the evacuation plan and chose to go with

Ridgemont. The high school is a 14 minute walk away and we are crossing Heron Road which is a major intersection. Dennis reached out to Safe Schools staff and Ottawa police to escort the students. The Ottawa police responded saying they will if they can they will but they may not be able to commit their resources to help us cross Heron Road. The evacuation plan will still say Ridgemont High School, and the police will be contacted when we are evacuating and request assistance. The amendment has been made to the Evacuation Plan and submitted to the superintendent.

Voluntary School Fees

Purchases from teachers for February. In the fall, we raised just over \$1000 for Intermediate students, \$1893 for Junior students. For Kinders, we raised \$931 and Primary students \$1649. The voluntary school fees are used as enhancements for the students, but also towards paying for field trips for students who can't afford to pay for their field trip, they are also used for extras in the classroom. We don't use it necessarily for things that the School Operating Budget should pay for.

During the staff meeting yesterday, they discussed what a suitable request for school council and operating budget is.

There have been purchases made, but they are not reflected in the amounts mentioned earlier. Voluntary School Fees are used to supplement what is happening in the classroom and pay for things that the operating budget wouldn't normally pay for.

Construction Update

Construction continues. For Councillor Carr. The steam caused some issues and signaled the end of the reign of the steam boiler heating the building. There has been a lot of work done to replace the heating systems. The HVAC constructions are ongoing and work is on schedule and the contractor is pleased with the work. The contractor invited Dennis to go up but still needs a hard hat in order to look at the work, but from the outside the glass is moved into place in the windows and the units will move into place shortly. The contractor requested to close down the Kindergarten yard for 2 days and our staff found alternative areas in the yard for the children to play. Construction is limited to the 2nd Floor. This is good for next year when we can regain access to thearea, specifically the Library.

• Health and Safety Award

Our chief custodian, Mr. Séguin, is a special guy. He makes sure, no matter what time of year it is, that the entrance is clear so our boots can touch the asphalt. He shovels the snow pretty impressively. We are pleased with the work he has done for us, especially throughout the pandemic in helping the staff feel very safe and are very grateful to him. Mr. Séguin has been nominated for the Health and Safety Award that goes through the joint occupational health and safety committee. That committee has awarded Mr. Séguin with the Health and Safety Award and it will be presented to him during a staff get together during the day. He is very deserving of this award and we are excited to recognize him for the hard work he does for our school.

New Item:

Book Fair Scholastic Rewards

In the past few days, teachers were telling Dennis about what to spend on with the Book Fair rewards (the school yielded over \$8000 in rewards).

Today, Dennis submitted a \$4691 order through Scholastic, which specifically targeted exactly what the teachers wanted. The school council has done an amazing job of organizing the Book Fair and making sure we have access to that money. Special thanks to Mais for pointing Dennis in the right direction to be able to access those rewards. Thank you on behalf of the staff, thank you to School Council and to the community for organizing the Book Fair.

6. Marty Carr, Ward 18 Alta Vista City Councillor

• Councillor Carr to introduces themselves and advise re: their plan for their term Councillor Carr used to be Chair of AVPS School Council for many years, and that was how she got involved with the community. It was nice to see familiar faces in the meeting and still involved. She will always be grateful to AVPS because without the experiences with the staff and working with everyone, she doesn't think her passion for community would be what it is today.

In 2016, Council Carr ran for School Board Trustee but wasn't successful. Then the Alta Vista Community asked her to be President. Issues around Youth Programming are still very important for her. For the next term, the issues that Councillor Carr will be focusing on have a lot to do with youth. As the community association president she was very involved with the Herongate file when it happened. Affordable housing is very important to her, community building. She is happy to know that the Spring Fair is coming back (end of May) and the Alta Vista Market will happen after that.

Since the start of the pandemic, the DMC community center (OCH Communities of Russell Heights) has been used as a physically distancing shelter because of the problems with affordable housing. So many people were in the shelter system. As president, they asked if they could use Gym Divelirino(?) and she agreed because it was vacant. She was told this week that they would be moved to the Heron Road Community Centre which is concerning because there will be two centers with no programming for youth in high needs areas.

Traffic concerns have been a long standing issue at Alta Vista Public School. In previous years, they worked hard on the Randall and Alta Vista Dr intersection because there were some students, including staff, who were hit in that intersection (students would now be in their first year of university). Traffic has always been an issue and Councillor Carr will get back to us on this.

Snow clearing - we do have a very responsive snow clearing manager. He's usually happy to do a site visit.

One thing that has come to her attention when she was Chair of the School Council, there was a lot of interest from the people in the community about a multicultural mural that was taken

down in 2015. It was a gift to the school council a few years earlier and some parents and staffers asked if it could be reinstated. If anyone is interested in contacting Councillor Carr about this mural, she left a list of names to Alta Vista School Council. The petition created by Councillor Carr's husband is still available on the internet.

- Dennis and Melissa to advise re: items of importance to AVPS
- City maintenance around the exterior of school property (snow clearing at the crosswalk from Ridgecrest across Randall, etc.)

Is it possible to have more signage on Beaver and Ridgecrest where there could be No Parking on the road during specific times? What is being done to increase the actual regulation of the No Parking zone?

Councillor Carr will contact Riley Carter in traffic to do a walk around, and can be done in the spring.

During large snowfalls, Radka (Crossguard) would have to call 311 in order to have the crosswalk cleared. The sidewalk was usually cleared, but not the crosswalk, leaving students to climb over a large snow bank.

Councillor Carr will follow up about the maintenance of the crosswalk.

- Traffic around the school
- Is there any option you have to support traffic control in the case of an evacuation where the police are able to help?
- o Options for traffic control should evacuation plan need to be be enacted (police might not be able to support with helping to navigate crossing Heron/Alta Vista)

Councillor Carr is not sure about other options for support with the police because they are quite strapped. She learned that at any time, 20% of the police officers are off on leave, typical of the nature of work. She will follow up about this.

She also suggested possibly looking at Rideau Park Church for the Evacuation Plan, it is a very large church and we don't have to deal with Heron Road. Dennis will look into this.

Questions from Council and members at large

The City of Ottawa Buses, is it possible to look into deploying city buses for evacuation alternatives?

Councillor Carr can look into this as an option.

7. Teacher's Report (Teacher's Representative Seline Herz-Fischler)

All School: Thank you Parent Council. The BBoyizm Dance Company was AMAZING. Teachers were so happy to have a live show. For some of our little ones, this was the first assembly ever

We were so grateful to have this opportunity. One teacher said she had tears in her eyes seeing the students so excited. It was a hit for K-8!

Classes are discussing what love and kindness looks, sounds, and feels like this month.
